Yves Saint-Laurent showed an interest in fashion from an early age, critiquing his mother's clothes and sketching his own designs at school.

He was 18 when he started working with Christian Dior in Paris and 21 when Dior suffered a fatal heart attack, leaving Yves at the head of the Dior empire. His debut collection drove sales up by 35 per cent. Drafted into the military two years later, he lost his prestigious post.

Yves setup his own fashion label in 1962 and became the toast of haute couture and European society, befriending everyone from Marlene Dietrich to the Duchess of Windsor.

His 1966 tuxedo suit for women, 'Le Smoking' became an instant classic.

He never married or had children.

She was initially typecast in exotic roles, for example as a vamp or a woman of Asian descent, but her career prospects improved greatly following her portrayal of Nora Charles in *The Thin Man* (1934).

Although Loy was never nominated for a competitive Academy Award, in March 1991 she was presented with an Honorary Academy Award in recognition of her life's work both onscreen and off, including serving as assistant to the director of military and naval welfare for the Red Cross during World War II.

NATIONALITY American

Louis Armstrong was a trumpeter, bandleader, singer, soloist, film star and comedian. Considered one of the most influential artists in jazz history, he is known for songs like *Star Dust, La Vie En Rose* and *What a Wonderful World*.

Coming to prominence in the 1920s as an "inventive" trumpet and cornet player, Armstrong was a foundational influence in jazz, shifting the focus of the music from collective improvisation to solo performance. With his instantly recognizable gravelly voice, Armstrong was also an influential singer, demonstrating great dexterity as an improviser. He was also skilled at scat singing.

Armstrong is renowned for his charismatic stage presence and voice almost as much as for his trumpet playing.

NATIONALITY American

Neil Armstrong was an American astronaut and aeronautical engineer who was the first person to walk on the Moon. He was also a naval aviator, test pilot, and university professor.

During college, Neil was called up by the Navy and became a fighter pilot. He fought in the Korean War where he flew fighters from aircraft carriers. At one point his plane was hit by enemy fire, but he was able to eject and was safely rescued.

Armstrong was selected for the NASA Astronaut Corps in 1962. He made his first spaceflight as commander of Gemini 8 in March 1966, becoming NASA's first civilian astronaut to fly in space. In July 1969, Armstrong was spacecraft commander for Apollo 11, and became the first man to walk on the moon.

Enid Blyton (also known as Mary Pollock) was the most successful children's writer of her generation. A prolific writer, she completed over 400 books during her lifetime. Her books have sold over 600 million copies.

Filmmaker Sir Alfred Joseph Hitchcock is widely regarded as one of the most influential filmmakers in the history of cinema.

Redford is also an accomplished director, producer and entrepreneur. He is the founder of the Sundance Film Festival. Coco Chanel (born Gabrielle Bonheur Chanel) was the founder and namesake of the Chanel brand. Chanel was credited in the post-World War I era with liberating women from the constraints of the "corseted silhouette" and popularizing a sporty, casual chic as the feminine standard of style.

A prolific fashion creator, Chanel extended her influence beyond couture clothing, realizing her design aesthetic in jewelry, handbags, and fragrance. Her signature scent, Chanel No. 5, has become an iconic product.

Rumors arose about Chanel's activities in the course of the German occupation of France during World War II. She was later interrogated but not charged as a collaborator although many viewed her relationship with a Nazi officer as a betrayal of her country.

Jim Reeves was a country music singer who had success early on in his career with hits such as *I Love You* (a duet with Ginny Wright), *Mexican Joe*, and *Bimbo* which reached Number 1 on the U.S. Country Charts in 1954.

With records charting from the 1950s to the 1960s, he became well known as a practitioner of the Nashville sound (older country-style music mixed with elements of pop music).

Reeves' greatest hit was He'll Have To Go, a success on both the popular and country music charts, which earned him a platinum record. His international popularity rose during the 1960s, helping to give country music a worldwide market for the first time. Known as "Gentleman Jim", his songs continued to chart for years after his death. Reeves died in the crash of his private airplane. He was married with no children.

Embracing non-traditional scales and tonal structures, Claude Debussy is one of the most highly regarded composers of the late 19th and early 20th centuries and is seen as the founder of musical impressionism.

He was born into a poor family in France. Gifted at the piano, he was accepted into the Paris Conservatory at age 11. He found his vocation in innovative composition. He took many years to develop his mature style, and was nearly forty before achieving international fame in 1902 with the only opera he completed, *Pelléas et Mélisande*.

Debussy's orchestral works include *Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune* (1894), *Nocturnes* (1897–99), and *Images* (1905–12). His music was to a considerable extent a reaction against Wagner and the German musical tradition.

Head of the Gambino crime family in New York City from 1957 until his death, Carlo "Don Carlo" Gambino was one of the most powerful mob bosses of his era.

Born in Sicily, he stowed away on a ship bound for the United States when he was 19 years old. He worked as a strong-man for the Castellano family during the prohibition era, and nurtured ties to Joe Masseria, "Lucky" Luciano, and Albert Anastasia. After Anastasia's death in 1957, Gambino took control of New York and eventually became known as the "Boss of Bosses", the most powerful gangster in America.

Unlike most gangsters of the '30s and '40s, Gambino kept a low profile, although he was close friends with Frank Sinatra. He was married with 4 children.

Sir Donald George Bradman, often referred to as "The Don", was an Australian international cricketer, widely acknowledged as the greatest batsman of all time. Bradman's career Test batting average of 99.94 has been cited as the greatest achievement by any sportsman in any major sport.

The story that the young Bradman practiced alone with a cricket stump and a golf ball is part of Australian folklore. Bradman's meteoric rise from bush cricket to the Australian Test team took just over two years. Before his 22nd birthday, he had set many records for top scoring, some of which still stand.

The German philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer named Wilhelm Meister's Apprenticeship one of the four greatest novels ever written (along with Tristram Shandy, La Nouvelle Héloïse, and Don Quixote).

His music videos, including those of *Beat It, Billie Jean*, and *Thriller* from his 1982 album *Thriller*, are credited with breaking racial barriers and transforming the medium into an art form and promotional tool. *Thriller* is the best-selling album of all time.

Jackson became a figure of controversy in the 1980s due to his changing physical appearance and behaviour.

Her father was the political philosopher William Godwin, and her mother was the philosopher and feminist Mary Wollstonecraft.



Yves Saint-Laurent showed an interest in fashion from an early age, critiquing his mother's clothes and sketching his own designs at school.

He was 18 when he started working with Christian Dior in Paris and 21 when Dior suffered a fatal heart attack, leaving Yves at the head of the Dior empire. His debut collection drove sales up by 35 per cent. Drafted into the military two years later, he lost his prestigious post.

Yves setup his own fashion label in 1962 and became the toast of haute couture and European society, befriending everyone from Marlene Dietrich to the Duchess of Windsor.

His 1966 tuxedo suit for women, 'Le Smoking' became an instant classic.

He never married or had children.

Myrna Loy made more than 120 pictures, including all six of the *Thin Man* movies.

Originally a dancer, Loy devoted herself to an acting career following a few minor roles in silent films. She was initially typecast in exotic roles, for example as a vamp or a woman of Asian descent, but her career prospects improved greatly following her portrayal of Nora Charles in *The Thin Man* (1934).

Although Loy was never nominated for a competitive Academy Award, in March 1991 she was presented with an Honorary Academy Award in recognition of her life's work both onscreen and off, including serving as assistant to the director of military and naval welfare for the Red Cross during World War II.

BORN August 4th, 1901
DIED 2008 (aged 71)
NATIONALITY American

Louis Armstrong was a trumpeter, bandleader, singer, soloist, film star and comedian. Considered one of the most influential artists in jazz history, he is known for songs like *Star Dust, La Vie En Rose* and *What a Wonderful World*.

Coming to prominence in the 1920s as an "inventive" trumpet and cornet player, Armstrong was a foundational influence in jazz, shifting the focus of the music from collective improvisation to solo performance. With his instantly recognizable gravelly voice, Armstrong was also an influential singer, demonstrating great dexterity as an improviser. He was also skilled at scat singing.

Armstrong is renowned for his charismatic stage presence and voice almost as much as for his trumpet playing.

He was married 4 times and had 2 children.

NATIONALITY American

Neil Armstrong was an American astronaut and aeronautical engineer who was the first person to walk on the Moon. He was also a naval aviator, test pilot, and university professor.

During college, Neil was called up by the Navy and became a fighter pilot. He fought in the Korean War where he flew fighters from aircraft carriers. At one point his plane was hit by enemy fire, but he was able to eject and was safely rescued.

Armstrong was selected for the NASA Astronaut Corps in 1962. He made his first spaceflight as commander of Gemini 8 in March 1966, becoming NASA's first civilian astronaut to fly in space. In July 1969, Armstrong was spacecraft commander for Apollo 11, and became the first man to walk on the moon.

Margaretha Geertruida Zelle, better known by the stage name Mata Hari, was a Dutch exotic dancer and courtesan who was convicted of being a spy for Germany during World War I.

Mata Hari was a professional dancer and mistress who accepted an assignment to spy for France in 1916. Not long after, however, Mata Hari was accused of being a German spy. She was executed in 1917 after French authorities learned of her alleged double agency.

Zelle has often been portrayed as a femme fatale, a dangerous, seductive woman who used her sexuality to effortlessly manipulate men. Others view her differently: historians have said she was naïve and easily duped, a victim of men rather than a victimizer.

Aged 14, Griffith began dating Don Johnson, her mother's 22-year-old co-star in *The Harrad Experiment*. The relationship culminated in a six-month marriage.

Enid Blyton (also known as Mary Pollock) was the most successful children's writer of her generation. A prolific writer, she completed over 400 books during her lifetime. Her books have sold over 600 million copies.

Following the commercial success of her early novels such as Adventures of the Wishing-Chair (1937) and The Enchanted Wood (1939), Blyton went on to build a literary empire, sometimes producing fifty books a year. She is best remembered today for her Noddy, Famous Five, and Secret Seven series.

Her books were controversial amongst literary critics and librarians who did not consider her writings to be good literature. Regardless, they were very popular and helped inspire an interest in reading to a generation of children.

Filmmaker Sir Alfred Joseph Hitchcock is widely regarded as one of the most influential filmmakers in the history of cinema.

Known as "the Master of Suspense", he directed 53 feature films in a career spanning six decades. He became as well-known as any of his actors thanks to his many interviews, his cameo roles in most of his films, and his hosting of *Alfred Hitchcock Presents* (1955–1965).

Born in London, he worked for a short time in engineering before entering the film industry in 1920. He left for Hollywood in 1939, where his first American film, *Rebecca* (1940), won an Academy Award for Best Picture. Hitchcock created more than 50 films, including the classics *Rear Window* (1954) and *Psycho* (1960).

Robert Redford became a major Hollywood star following his role in *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* (1969) in which he co-starred with Paul Newman. In 1973 he had the greatest hit of his career, with the blockbuster *The Sting*, for which he was nominated for an Academy Award.

Redford is also an accomplished director, producer and entrepreneur. He is the founder of the Sundance Film Festival. The first film he directed, *Ordinary People* (1980), was one of the most critically and publicly acclaimed films of the decade, winning four Oscars including Best Picture and the Academy Award for Best Director for Redford.

Coco Chanel (born Gabrielle Bonheur Chanel) was the founder and namesake of the Chanel brand. Chanel was credited in the post-World War I era with liberating women from the constraints of the "corseted silhouette" and popularizing a sporty, casual chic as the feminine standard of style.

A prolific fashion creator, Chanel extended her influence beyond couture clothing, realizing her design aesthetic in jewelry, handbags, and fragrance. Her signature scent, Chanel No. 5, has become an iconic product.

Rumors arose about Chanel's activities in the course of the German occupation of France during World War II. She was later interrogated but not charged as a collaborator although many viewed her relationship with a Nazi officer as a betrayal of her country.

Jim Reeves was a country music singer who had success early on in his career with hits such as *I Love You* (a duet with Ginny Wright), *Mexican Joe*, and *Bimbo* which reached Number 1 on the U.S. Country Charts in 1954.

With records charting from the 1950s to the 1960s, he became well known as a practitioner of the Nashville sound (older country-style music mixed with elements of pop music).

Reeves' greatest hit was He'll Have To Go, a success on both the popular and country music charts, which earned him a platinum record. His international popularity rose during the 1960s, helping to give country music a worldwide market for the first time. Known as "Gentleman Jim", his songs continued to chart for years after his death. Reeves died in the crash of his private airplane. He was married with no children.



Composer

BORN August 22nd, 1862 **DIED** 1918 (aged 55) **NATIONALITY** French

Embracing non-traditional scales and tonal structures, Claude Debussy is one of the most highly regarded composers of the late 19th and early 20th centuries and is seen as the founder of musical impressionism.

He was born into a poor family in France. Gifted at the piano, he was accepted into the Paris Conservatory at age 11. He found his vocation in innovative composition. He took many years to develop his mature style, and was nearly forty before achieving international fame in 1902 with the only opera he completed, Pelléas et Mélisande.

Debussy's orchestral works include Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune (1894), Nocturnes (1897–99), and Images (1905– 12). His music was to a considerable extent a reaction against Wagner and the German musical tradition.

He was married twice and had one daughter.



Actor & Dancer

BORN August 23rd, 1912
DIED 1996 (aged 83)
NATIONALITY American

Gene Kelly was known for his energetic and athletic dancing style, his good looks, and the likable characters that he played on-screen.

Best known for his performances in films such as *An American in Paris* (1951), *Anchors Aweigh* (1945) and *Singin' in the Rain* (1952), he starred in musical films until they fell out of fashion in the late 1950s.

His many dance innovations transformed the Hollywood musical, and he is credited with almost single-handedly making the ballet form commercially acceptable to film audiences.

Kelly received an Academy Honorary Award in 1952 for his career achievements, the same year *An American in Paris* won six Academy Awards, including Best Picture.

He was married 3 times and had 3 children.

Mafia Boss

BORN August 24th, 1902
DIED 1976 (aged 74)
NATIONALITY Italian & American

Head of the Gambino crime family in New York City from 1957 until his death, Carlo "Don Carlo" Gambino was one of the most powerful mob bosses of his era.

Born in Sicily, he stowed away on a ship bound for the United States when he was 19 years old. He worked as a strong-man for the Castellano family during the prohibition era, and nurtured ties to Joe Masseria, "Lucky" Luciano, and Albert Anastasia. After Anastasia's death in 1957, Gambino took control of New York and eventually became known as the "Boss of Bosses", the most powerful gangster in America.

Unlike most gangsters of the '30s and '40s, Gambino kept a low profile, although he was close friends with Frank Sinatra. He was married with 4 children.

Academy Award-winning Scottish actor Sir Sean Connery is best known for playing 007 in the early *James Bond* spy movies.

In the early '60s, he landed the lead role of James Bond in *Dr. No*, continuing the role in follow-ups like *Goldfinger* and *Thunderball* while gaining massive popularity.

He worked regularly in film thereafter, and in 1987 won an Academy Award in the category of supporting actor for *The Untouchables*. Connery later starred in the adventure films *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade* and *The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen*.

His film career also includes such films as Marnie, The Name of the Rose, The Hunt for Red October and Murder on the Orient Express.

Connery was knighted in the 2000 New Year Honors for services to Film Drama. He has been married twice and has one son.



In 1979, Mother Teresa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize and became a symbol of charitable, selfless work.

A controversial figure during her life and after her death, Teresa was admired by many for her charitable work.

NATIONALITY Australian

Sir Donald George Bradman, often referred to as "The Don", was an Australian international cricketer, widely acknowledged as the greatest batsman of all time. Bradman's career Test batting average of 99.94 has been cited as the greatest achievement by any sportsman in any major sport.

The story that the young Bradman practiced alone with a cricket stump and a golf ball is part of Australian folklore. Bradman's meteoric rise from bush cricket to the Australian Test team took just over two years. Before his 22nd birthday, he had set many records for top scoring, some of which still stand.

He became Australia's sporting idol at the height of the Great Depression. Bradman consistently scored at a level that made him "worth three batsmen to Australia". He was married with 2 children.

NATIONALITY German

Poet, novelist, and playwright Johann Wolfgang von Goethe provided the Sturm und Drang movement with its first novel, *The Sorrows of Young Werther*, in which he created the prototype of the Romantic Hero.

He was a literary celebrity by the age of 25. Goethe's first major scientific work, the *Metamorphosis of Plants*, was published in 1788. This was followed by *Wilhelm Meister's Apprenticeship* and then *Faust*, the first part of his most celebrated drama.

The German philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer named Wilhelm Meister's Apprenticeship one of the four greatest novels ever written (along with Tristram Shandy, La Nouvelle Héloïse, and Don Quixote).

NATIONALITY American

Known as the "King of Pop," Michael Jackson was one of the most popular entertainers in the world. The eighth child of the Jackson family, Michael made his professional debut in 1964 with his elder brothers in *The Jackson 5*.

He began his solo career in 1971. In the early 1980s, Jackson became a dominant figure in popular music. His music videos, including those of *Beat It, Billie Jean*, and *Thriller* from his 1982 album *Thriller*, are credited with breaking racial barriers and transforming the medium into an art form and promotional tool. *Thriller* is the best-selling album of all time.

Jackson became a figure of controversy in the 1980s due to his changing physical appearance and behaviour.

He was married twice, once to Lisa Marie Presley, the daughter of Elvis Presley. He had 3 children.

Mary Shelley is best known for her horror novel *Frankenstein*, or *The Modern Prometheus* (1818). She also edited and promoted the works of her husband, the Romantic poet and philosopher Percy Bysshe Shelley.

The idea for *Frankenstein* was famously conceived during a summer spent with Lord Byron in Switzerland.

Shelley also wrote several other books including *Valperga* (1823), *The Last Man* (1826), the autobiographical *Lodore* (1835) and the posthumously published *Mathilde*.

Her father was the political philosopher William Godwin, and her mother was the philosopher and feminist Mary Wollstonecraft.

Shelley was married and had 4 children.
